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Dear Prof. Fitzgerald

Many thanks for yours. I
had thought of the possibility of mixing
the dyes and the day after your departure
stained paper & gelatine in Cyanine &
Erythrosine (blue & red) also gelatine
in my 3 inks, mixed, which gave together
a blackish olive. Exposed under
Coloured glasses they all seemed to
fade together under the blue & green
glasses and hardly at all under the
red. I tried separating the paper into
4, 8, or 16 but got not better result - they now
blackened over together. To day I began
some experiments using a yellow glass over
all to cut off ultra-violet light as
I thought this might act too quickly

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and hide the other effect.

I fear the mixing of the dyes (except possibly as fine precipitates) will not do, however; for I think that if the particles are so close together they will 'critochromatize' each other & transfer absorbed energy one to another.

The idea of depending on drying to fix will I fear be ineffectual for so far as my eyes go really unstable dyes cannot be preserved even by drying & varnishing. There must, as you say, be hosts of rejected dyes if we only knew of them quite positive enough if we could find them.

Curious enough I took up the number of the amateur Philately for the week and see that Lomme is working to "produce colored pictures by bleaching". The reference adds that producing colored pictures by bleaching is old - datig from before Daguerre what 'colored pictures' means I don't know; but I am going to lodge Prov. Prof. Wm Morris for it would not do for some one else to make a success of it (! !) unless we have some hold over it.

The new screen came back from Grubb to day - but I have not had time to test it as it only arrived late.
