Please lay my resignation of the Office

to the Council along ~~the other By Laws~~ the only serious attempt that

members to work for the Society. ~~This was~~ The  
other matters involved in yesterday's vote which  
makes ~~the vote~~ <sup>so</sup> ambiguous and  
~~the~~ <sup>although</sup> I believe the Society will very probably  
rescind that vote as far as it related to  
the encouragement of its scientific functions  
when it really understands the ~~matter~~ the true bearing of this  
~~yet as~~ <sup>yet as</sup> I have been working for the Society  
worked

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for a number of years under the impression that the Society was most anxious to advance its scientific functions, ~~as~~ was evidenced by its previous vote upon <sup>This</sup> ~~the~~ question of Fellowships, <sup>very</sup> ~~and~~ <sup>But</sup> as I now find that the Society <sup>is not seriously</sup> does not seem at all anxious to encourage <sup>its</sup> ~~all~~ <sup>members</sup> to take much trouble ~~declared~~ to work for the Society ~~and~~ <sup>that I have acted</sup> has been at great personal inconvenience and <sup>the work</sup> as it has been ~~an~~ most irksome and disagreeable work, therefore I take this opportunity of enabling the Society to obtain the services of some member whose life work the Society does desire to advance P I have stated that the proposal of Fellowships is the only serious attempt of the Society to advance its scientific functions, although it is upon <sup>the</sup> ~~the~~ vitality <sup>of these that</sup> all its efforts, I do not say claims, to Leinster

House depend. The Society by its agreement has acknowledged the principle contended for by the Government that its right to accommodation in Leinster House ~~is~~ limited by the vitality of its scientific functions. The Society provides evening scientific meetings and publishes scientific journals but so far from there being any encouragement to <sup>its</sup> ~~Scientific workers~~ members <sup>only</sup> to work for the Society, they are the means by which ~~those members~~ support the reputation of the ~~Scientific workers work~~ for the Society at great inconvenience and ~~serious~~ loss to themselves. Unless the Society holds out some substantial result to be attained by the younger men ~~working for the Society~~, they dare not in justice to themselves resign the opportunity of working for London Societies where they will attain reputation much more surely than by ~~publishing their work in~~ the journals of the provincial society. If however they <sup>had</sup> a prospect of attaining an acknowledged local recognition such as the
